Congratulations to HGAC, its Board, staff, committee members, volunteers and members for an excellent run of 45 years!



## 2020 Pennsylvania Historic Preservation Award presented to the HGAC Barn Preservation Project and Grant Program.

Preservation Pennsylvania, the commonwealth's only statewide, private, nonprofit membership organization dedicated to the protection of historically and architecturally significant places has selected the Historic Gettysburg–Adams County (HGAC) Barn Preservation Project and Grant Program to receive the 2020 Henry A. Jordan Award. Preservation Pennsylvania's awards are presented annually and honor excellence and innovation in preservation practice. "The Historic Preservation Awards recognize a passion for the past, applaud achievements in the present, and inspire a history-rich future for Pennsylvania," said Mindy Crawford, Executive Director of Preservation Pennsylvania.

The Henry A. Jordan Award, which honors high achievement at the local level, is being presented to the HGAC Barn Preservation Project and Grant Program for encouraging and supporting preservation activities targeted at historic barns. This grassroots project to preserve historic barns in Adams County was founded in 2005. The project provides education, lectures, workshops, tours, and demonstrations. The barn grant program provides a monetary incentive for owners to maintain, rehabilitate and preserve their historic barns. The Barn

Preservation Project created and maintains the Adams County Barn Registry that now lists 356 of an estimated 1500 historic barns within Adams County.

This Award is named for Henry A. Jordan (1936-2010), a former Preservation Pennsylvania Board Chairman and life-long supporter of the historic preservation movement. In keeping with Henry's belief that it is at the local level where real historic preservation occurs, this award honors outstanding historic preservation efforts at the local/regional level. As the recipient, the HGAC Barn Preservation Project will receive a custom-made Mercer Tile that will be presented at the annual membership meeting of Preservation Pennsylvania. The HGAC Barn Preservation Project itself recognizes the accomplishments of barn owners in maintaining and preserving their barns in a number of ways. All barns in the Adams County Historic Barn Registry receive a sign bearing the catalog entry number of that barn. In addition, a Barn Preservation Award plaque is given every year to one barn in which extra effort has been put into its maintenance and preservation. This year, the Cornerstone Barn, now owned by Kathleen Reilly and Parry Bair received that award.

To inventory, track, study and recognize the historic barns within the county, HGAC created the Adams County Barn Registry with the help of a grant received from the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission in 2005. Through that grant, Noble Preservation Services, Inc. provided HGAC with professional advice and ideas for designing and conducting our barn survey and establishing the registry. HGAC realized it would not be able to come up with enough money to pay professional staff to inventory all of Adams County's barns, but among HGAC's 200 members, at least a dozen dedicated volunteers stepped forward to begin the inventory. Volunteers were trained to collect photographs, measurements and other information using survey methods recommended by cultural resource professionals. Every year, about twenty barns were surveyed and added to the registry at the request of barn owners who had heard about the registry through our outreach program. Currently, 356 barns are listed in the Adams County Barn Registry out of an estimated 1500 historic barns in the county.

As the number of barns that were surveyed went from the dozens to the hundreds, the HGAC volunteers gained a much better understanding of the barns particular to Adams County and they have been able to share that and their enthusiasm for preserving barns with the barn owners. After each barn survey is completed, the data from the survey form is entered into a database and the information about the barn, including captioned photos and maps is provided in a report to the barn owner. The report includes a brief summary prepared by an HGAC Barn Preservation Specialist that addresses the unique aspects of the barn along with recommendations for dealing with threats to the barn such as failing foundations, leaking roofs and/or other structural issues.

In addition to providing barn owners with information about their barns, in 2013, HGAC began providing matching grants of up to \$2,500 to barn owners so that they would be encouraged to undertake essential preservation work on their barns. So far, HGAC has provided grants to 17 barn owners totaling \$26,585. Because of the required match, these 17 projects have resulted in over \$100,000 of work being completed on historic barns in Adams County since 2013. An additional eleven barns on the registry will be receiving grant funds from HGAC in 2020. Funding for the grants comes from HGAC fund-raising activities such as our annual BarnArt Show & Sale, Civil War era Barn Dances, special film screenings and Historic Barns tours. One of the innovative aspects of the grant program is that it encourages barn owners to take one-step-at-a-time in preserving their barn, rather than thinking that if they can't rebuild the whole

barn they should do nothing. This foot-in-the-door approach has succeeded and resulted in encouraging barn preservation by many barn owners who would have otherwise been discouraged by the size of the job before them.

Ongoing sponsorship of the project is provided by a number of generous corporate and private donors. And a mini-grant provided by the South Mountain Partnership in 2017 has further expanded the capabilities of the program and provided a replicable barn survey format and a printed Field Guide to the Historic Barns of Adams County, Pennsylvania (soon available for purchase from HGAC).

HGAC's Barn Preservation Project has been steadily growing for fifteen years and it has encouraged local interest in historic barn preservation. The project serves additional County residents and visitors to the County by providing accurate information about historic barns themselves such as; when were they built, how were they designed, what materials were used in their construction and how the barn is historically significant. Project volunteers and staff continue to spread the word about barn preservation by leading tours, appearing on television and radio, giving lectures and providing articles for newspapers.



# Cornerstone Barn Honored with the 2020 HGAC Barn Preservation Award

Parry Baer and Kathleen Reilly are the proud owners of the Cornerstone Barn, at the 7 Sky Farm on Crooked Creek Road in Franklin Township, and they are being honored by HGAC with the 2020 Barn Preservation Award for the tremendous job that they did of restoring their late 19th century barn.

The barn had different owners when it was surveyed on July 17, 2015 by a team led by Kendra Debany and was noted as number 185 on the HGAC Barn Registry. The barn is a standard Pennsylvania barn measuring 71 feet long by 45 feet deep, including an 8 foot forebay. Parry and Kathleen purchased the barn in 2017 and between August and October of 2019, they undertook extensive repairs and restoration of their barn with the help of the Stone Ridge Construction company. Their goal was to make the barn look more like the original barn and to add some tasteful, useful accents. The roof was coming off, so replacing that was the first order of business along with removing and replacing any rotten beams. Then new siding was added and the vents, windows and doors were replaced. Three working, vented cupolas and two pent roofs were then put onto the barn.

On our barn surveys, we are always interested in what we can find out about the builders of these magnificent structures, and although we do not know the names of the original builders, the crew that carefully restored this barn is known to us and was composed of Greg Lane and Ike, Sam, Ivan, John, Jason and Nathan Zook. Some of the crew can be seen on the roof in the adjacent picture that shows much of the barn's timber framing without being obscured by



siding. The other picture shows the barn in its final restored state, a beautiful sight indeed. Thank you Parry and Kathleen for the effort than you put into restoring your barn and for furthering the work of barn preservation in Adams County.


