Historic Gettysburg-Adams County recognized two home owners with 2020 House Award plaques. These annual awards are given in recognition for efforts to preserve, restore, and maintain historic homes in Adams County.



Patrick and Linda Spellman of Littlestown were recognized for "The Shoemaker House," built in 1820. The house is constructed of log with a brick veneer and has been beautifully restored and maintains most of its original charm.



Joel and Cathy Hertz, owners of "Shaker Ridge," circa - 1855, located in Bear Mountain just above Bendersville, received the second award for their reconstructed log home. Most of the work was done by the owners themselves, including handmade cabinetry, flooring, and all interior trim.

HGAC President Anne Zabawa and House Award Chairperson Dean Norwich presented the awards to the homeowners in early November.

The awards were the 144th and 145th presented by HGAC.




Online Store

PRESERVING WHAT WE CAN



The idea for the HGAC Architectural Salvage Warehouse was born when HGAC members realized that many usable items being sent to landfills could be recycled or repurposed. Parts of old doors could be re-imagined into coffee tables, cupboards, bookcases, and benches. Window sashes could be reborn as large greenhouses, shadow boxes, and picture frames. With a little imagination, old rustic wheelbarrows, metal gates, galvanized tubs and buckets, and even metal beds could reappear as artistic additions to a garden landscape.

What a great idea: provide an ongoing local and inexpensive resource for historic and vintage architectural objects for re-use in today's restoration, renovation and decorating projects.

Owners of historic buildings and construction contractors donate architectural elements which are then sold by HGAC to fund its mission of historic preservation here in Adams County. It's a win-win situation: encouraging preservation while raising funds for HGAC's mission.

The HGAC Architectural Salvage Warehouse has a steady stream of old Civil War era windows, shutters, multi paneled doors, porch columns, wavy paned glass, old door locks, hinges and door knobs, vintage tools, old boards and wood molding, lamp parts and globes, split rail fencing, paver bricks and much much more. Most objects originate here in the historic Gettysburg and Adams County area.

Sometimes property owners invite Warehouse volunteers to visit de-construction sites to "salvage" as many objects as possible before demolition is complete (see photos). We encourage you to spread the word to your friends to look in their attic or in their barn to donate gems from by gone days covered in dust or behind cobwebs. So remember the

Warehouse when you need "seasoned" materials for your building or decorating projects.

At this time the **HGAC Architectural Salvage Warehouse** is open by appointment only for sales and donations. Donations can be made by scheduling a visit to the Warehouse, or by arranging for HGAC to pick up donated items. Remember that 100% of sales and donations benefit HGAC's preservation projects, and can be tax deductable.

The Warehouse is located at the Daniel Lady Farm at 986 Hanover Road, Gettysburg on Rt. 116 just 5 minutes south from Lincoln Square in Gettysburg.





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HGAC grants help preserve 11 barns this year

The maximum grant amount of \$2,500 must be matched by the barn owner's labor or a cash outlay of that amount for materials or contract labor. One of the goals of HGAC is to help fund as many barn preservation projects as possible and to help barn owners by providing technical advice and recommendations.

All projects are reviewed using 10 criteria contained in the grant guidelines including the visibility of the barn to the general public, the age of the barn, the need for immediate repairs and whether the work will help maintain the historic character of the barn. There are often a host of maintenance and preservation issues that barn owners are faced with, and HGAC's grants encourage taking on one project at a time rather than throwing in the towel and demolishing the barn.

The work being funded in 2020 includes roof replacement on three barns, roof coating, replacing gutters, replacing sills, post and piers, gable wall restoration, rebuilding a gable wall, replacing doors, repairing foundation masonry and replacing a barn ramp retaining wall, according to the release.

The barns being preserved this year are shown in the accompanying photos and can be found from Abbottstown to Fairfield and many places in between. Most of the barns can easily be seen from nearby paved roads.

Curt Musselman, executive director of the HGAC Barn Preservation Project, notes this is the largest number of grants to preserve barns on the HGAC Barn Register since grants were first provided by HGAC in 2013.

Our success is thanks to the generosity of our Barn Preservation Project sponsors including the Rice Fruit Company, the Knouse Foods Corporation, the ACNB Bank, the South Mountain Partnership, Beech Springs Farm, Future Stake Inc., the Gettysburg Times, Destination Gettysburg, Sherwin Williams and all of the other individuals who made donations to the John and Mary Horner Fund for Barn Preservation.

One thing that all of our donors have in common is that they value the contribution that these iconic structures make to our historic and largely rural communities. Many of these solidly built barns continue to serve the agriculture industry even though they may be fulfilling a different role than they were originally intended to carry out.

Historic barns no longer used in agriculture still help to preserve the agricultural settings and historic landscapes that are so important to the tourism industry and to preserving the rural character of Adams County.

If you own a barn and want to be considered for a barn preservation grant in 2021, applications are now being accepted for consideration until March 1, 2021. Grants are only awarded to historic barns that are within Adams County and that are listed on the HGAC Barn Register.

At the present time, the register includes over 350 barns, which is about 24 percent of the historic barns in the county. Barns are added to the Register by HGAC, at the request of the barn owners.

Inclusion in the register provides recognition of the barn and the opportunity to participate in the HGAC grant program, but inclusion does not legally bind the owner in any way whatsoever.

It is expected that the grant money to be disbursed by HGAC in 2021 will help with the stabilization and repair of at least six more historic barns. Once again this year, additional funds are available to HGAC to be specifically awarded to barns in the Adams County Fruit Belt. Only two of the eleven barns receiving grant awards in 2020 were from within that region of the county.

There is no application fee to apply for the grant if the barn owner is an HGAC member. If an applicant is not an HGAC member for the year 2021, their application must include a check for \$25 to become a member of HGAC for the year.

2020 Giving Spree a Big Success

Results were recently announced for the 2020 Giving Spree hosted by the Adams County Community Foundation. Altogether, 95 organizations received over \$2.14M. HGAC is pleased to share with you that donors (including stretch fund donors) contributed \$15,284 to HGAC.

Thanks to 16 "Founding Donors", we have \$7,441 (including stretch funds) in our new HGAC Endowment that will grow for future HGAC work. And, thanks to 43 donors, we added \$7,843 (including stretch funds) to the general account for immediate use by the Board. These funds help in replacing money that might have been contributed through normal fund-raising efforts. Ralph Serpe, ACCF Executive Director, personally complimented HGAC on doing so well with our initial HGAC Endowment fund raising.

In this time of immediate needs, our donors said it's important for HGAC to continue working, both now and into the future, to preserve historic Adams County. Perhaps donors value our historic barns and homes as a reminder that well-built, maintained, and/or repaired buildings outlast a disrupter like a pandemic.



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




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
